

### A Message from Our Chairman

Throughout my 56 years in this business, I've often reminded people that insurance is a conduit—it pools resources to help manage the catastrophic costs of storms and accidents.

Inflation has undoubtedly had a significant impact on the insurance risk management industry. Throughout most of my career, hail claims typically averaged under \$3,000. Today, however, those costs have risen significantly, far surpassing that amount. The rising costs of cars and repairs have also contributed to this trend, with repair inflation ultimately reflected in premiums.

Homeowners in Texas are currently facing significant challenges due to the limited availability of roof coverage, even with higher deductibles set at 3%. Some property and casualty insurance experts suggest, this situation could result in some property owners being responsible for covering roof repairs out of pocket, as there are few viable coverage options available.

Please know that Ag Workers and our subsidiary agency, Insureberry, are committed to supporting our policyowners. We're working to underwrite select risks and keep overhead costs as low as possible.
